10 **MINUTES** Mr. Molnar moved, Mr. Engle seconded and motion carried unanimously on a voice vote to
11 approve the minutes of the meeting of March 23, 2017.

13 **FINANCIAL REPORT** Ms. Tulley moved, Mr. Bilkie seconded and motion carried unanimously on a
14 voice vote acknowledging receipt of Finance Report dated March 31, 2017.

25 their swift, knowledgeable action and that of Mike Visor, who was first person to administer CPR
26 on his friend Caitlin Burch when she was found totally un-responsive. The accumulative action of
27 all of the above individuals saved the life of Ms. Burch.

28
29 Emergency Room Specialist Dr. Spaner and Macedonia fire department’s medical advisor
30 explained that Ms. Burch’s miraculous survival was predicated on what is known as the Chain of
31 Survival, the life-saving chain whereby the weakest link can make survival a non-reality. Dr.
32 Spanner explained that Ms. Burch survived because her friend, Mark Visor immediately started
33 CPR using the American Heart Association’s newest protocol established October 15, 2015. Dr.
34 Spanner stated that the AMA announced two certainties when saving a life, excellent CPR and
35 early defibrillation. The new protocol is easier because it only requires chest compressions. The
36 proper compression of the heart is 100 per minute at the correct depth. Dr. Spaner added it was
37 the human element, Mr. Visor who started the life saving process for Ms. Burch then the Lucas
38 CPR Chest Commission Machine, for which Macedonia has, continued to provide the mechanic
39 precision that was integral in her being here today.

41 **PUBLIC COMMENTS**

42
43 ~~~ **Kathy Loya, 9186 North Bedford Road** stated, “The rain event that hit Macedonia on the evening
44 of Wednesday, April 19, 2017, was quite spectacular and hopefully it has once again brought back to the
45 surface the stormwater problems that face Macedonia as flooding was rampant around the city that night.
46 Situations that have been known about for years, even decades, did not go away by ignoring them. The
47 amount of stormwater retained on my property that evening was high, but expected for such a large and
48 unordinary rain event. Even in ordinary rain events my property and the properties of my neighbors

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49 serve as retention for stormwater from Ledge Road before it passes under North Bedford Road before
50 heading to Indian Creek. The City's retention area for this water - otherwise known as my property -
51 functioned perfectly that evening and thankfully my industrial-sized pumps functioned as well. The sump
52 pumps we had installed years ago push thousands of gallons of water away from our foundation - a
53 foundation that is fragile because of all of the water over all of these years. The sight of substantial water
54 on my property is nothing new. It goes on regularly and the City is well aware of it, but I am told that the
55 problem needs to be studied. With so much focus on City spending, I must remind Council of the wasted
56 \$50,000 spent in 2015 for the North Bedford and Ledge Drainage Study completed in January of 2016 by
57 GPD. The report, when received by the City, was simply disregarded with no discussion of its content to
58 the affected residents and no regard for funding suggestions made by GPD. Instead, this City has turned
59 my stormwater problem over to NEORSD so that they could do their own study to hopefully be
60 completed by 2018. Isn't that nice? What is nice is that maybe sometime in 2017 the home at 883
61 Iroquois Run will finally be demolished and a retention basin installed as it is budgeted for 2017 with
62 reimbursement from NEORSD's Community Cost Share program. While beneficial for the family that
63 was living there, I still have a hard time seeing the benefit to the city in the unanimous purchase of this
64 property - especially since it has sat vacant since December 2015 when the City took possession of the
65 property. Precedence was set for this city purchasing private property with significantly consistent
66 stormwater issues, but alas I must wait for yet another study to be completed for my stormwater situation.
67 It is quite hurtful to me and my family that others in this City with similar situations are treated
68 differently. I am also very concerned about what I read in the NewsLeader dated April 12, 2017, where
69 Summit County is now considering a stormwater program. What happens to me and my family if and/or
70 when Macedonia leaves the NEORSD Stormwater Management Program for a Summit County Surface
71 Water Management District as proposed by County Engineer Alan Brubaker? I will save this question for
72 another day. I can only say that my frustration with my stormwater situation only grows. My stormwater
73 issues are real and I believe critical because each year they get worse and worse and there is no future
74 plan for my issue. I am simply pushed aside and told to wait for yet another study. One may think that I
75 may hold a grudge against Macedonia because of this. What good is that going to do me, my family or
76 my City? Issue 3 on the May 2nd ballot is critical at this time so that planning of the future of Macedonia
77 can be dealt with in realistic terms. I appreciate the Town Hall meeting held in this chamber this evening
78 to discuss Issue 3 along with Mrs. Hanneken's meeting last Saturday, April 22 to discuss the issue as well.
79 The fact is that a 2% income tax rate as of July 1, 2017 is **not** an option. Frankly, I do not understand
80 why it is even brought up. A 2% income tax rate for Macedonia ceases to exist on July 1, 2017. The
81 options are a 1.75% income tax rate as of July 1st or a 2.25% income tax rate. That is the reality of the
82 situation - period. Services will be detrimentally impacted should the income tax rate fall to 1.75% on
83 July 1st. I rely on my city to perform services to maintain and improve City infrastructure. This is what a
84 city is supposed to do. That is what I expect from my city, but the means to do so must be provided. We
85 each have to put personal feelings aside and think about the place in which we live - our homes, our
86 community and our neighbors. I don't agree with everything the current administration does. I don't
87 agree with everything the current Council does. I don't agree with everything previous administrations
88 and/or Councils have done either, but I agree that Macedonia is a good place with good people. We have
89 good people working for the City that I believe genuinely enjoy their jobs, do their jobs to the best of their
90 abilities, and enjoy serving the people of this community. We as voters need to support them and give
91 them the means in which to serve us. We should not vote out of spite or out of anger for what has
92 happened in the past and/or present. It is now time to vote for the future. Thank you for your time.”

93
94 ~**Karen Bartolozzi, 1377 Driftwood Lane**, complained that road in front of her property is shifting in
95 such a way that is moving towards her driveway causing serious damage; the driveway is literally being
96 destroyed Ms. Bartolozzi stated. She said she has to pay hundreds of dollars several times to make

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97 repairs. This is not fair she stated. Is the City will to pay when more repairs are needed Ms. Bartolozzi
98 questioned?

136 MACEDONIA, AND ENTERING INTO AN AGREEMENT FOR SUCH SERVICES was **offered** by
137 Mr. Bilkie and moved Council waive the requirement that it be read by title on three different days,
138 instructing the Clerk to read it by **title for all three readings**. Second by Mr. Engle carried unanimously
139 on a voice vote.

148 with independent contractors do not need to be approved by Council. However as Mr. Socoloff will be
149 acting as Chief Building Official Mr. Guidetti thought it prudent that Mr. Socoloff agreement be
150 acknowledged legislatively.

152 **ORD. NO. 34-2017**

153 AN ORDINANCE AMENDING ORDINANCE NO. 19-2017 RELATIVE TO THE ANNUAL
154 APPROPRIATIONS FOR ADDITIONAL EXPENDITURES OF THE CITY OF MACEDONIA FOR
155 THE PERIOD JANUARY 1, 2017 TO DECEMBER 31, 2017 SERVICES was **offered** by Ms. Tulley and
156 moved Council waive the requirement that it be read by title on three different days, instructing the Clerk
157 to read it by **title for all three readings and waive the 48-hour rule of Council***. Second by Mr. Molnar
158 carried unanimously on a voice vote. * Law Director Guidetti determined suspension of 48-Rule
159 required because Clerk Arceci inadvertently did not include said ordinance in ePacket provided to all
160 members of Council two days before consideration of action was to be made.

161 Mr. Molnar moved, Ms. Tulley seconded and motion carried by majority voice vote (Mr. Engle
162 dissenting) to **amend in part Section 1 of ORD. NO. 34-2017** and as follows:
163

168 **ORD. NO. 35 -2017**

169 AN EMERGENCY ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING AND DIRECTING THE MAYOR TO ENTER
170 INTO AN AGREEMENT WITH THE OHIO DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION ENABLING
171 THE CITY OF MACEDONIA TO PARTICIPATE IN ODOT'S CONTRACT (018-18) FOR THE
172 PURCHASE OF ROAD SALT FOR THE 2017-2018 WINTER SEASON was **offered** by Mr. Molnar
173 and moved Council waive the requirement that it be read by title on three different days, instructing the
174 Clerk to read it by **title for all three readings**. Second by Mr. Engle carried unanimously on a voice vote.
175

176 Mr. Bilkie moved, Mr. Engle seconded, **adopt ORD. NO. 35-2017** and post according to law.
177

180 The motion carried, **ORD. NO. 35-2017 declared adopted.**
181

182 Relative to ORD. NO. 35-2017, Councilor Hanneken questioned why road salt is being purchased when it
183 was her understanding that the city has no space to store more salt.
184

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185 Discussion was had that a large portion of the road salt last season was used and that annually the City
186 must enter into a agreement for salt prior to the winter season to insure the availability of the salt when ti
187 is needed.

188
189 Council President Molnar explained that the delivery of the salt is not immediate. The early agreement
190 insures a guaranteed relationship between the City and ODOT, a per ton price established by the
191 minimum bid received by the state of Ohio. This price stays firms for the duration of the agreement and
192 the agreement does require a minimum order. Additional orders are at the same per ton price. The salt
193 order is not delivered however until the salt is needed Mr. Molnar added so there is not concern now for
194 having too much salt on hand with nowhere to store it.

195

196 **ORD. NO. 36 -2017**

197 CREATING CHAPTER 795 OF THE CITY OF MACEDONIA'S CODIFIED ORDINANCES
198 RELATIVE TO ENACTING REGULATIONS FOR MEDICAL MARIJUANA CULTIVATORS, AND
199 PROHIBITING DISPENSARIES AND PROCESSING CENTERS was **offered** by Mr. Molnar **for its**
200 **first reading by title only**. Second not required.

201

202 Regarding ORD. NO. 36-2017, Mayor Migliorini explained that when regulations were amended
203 regarding the use of medical marijuana in the state of Ohio Macedonia enacted a moratorium to determine
204 the City's options. The ordinance being considered would allow the cultivation of the plant but prohibits
205 processing the plant (processing centers) or dispensing it (dispensaries). The Mayor suggested an ideal
206 location for a cultivating facility would be the industrial zone of North Freeway Drive because there are
207 no residential properties within more than 1000 feet of the area. The Mayor explained that the state is
208 limiting the number of cultivating areas throughout Ohio to about four or five. Many communities have
209 enacted similar legislation; some allowing all three of the steps in the process. The city of Twinsburg is
210 currently talking with a cultivator Mayor Migliorini added. The Mayor understands that cultivating
211 facilities may generate about \$100 million dollars in annual revenue. Additional revenue is permitting
212 fees. Mayor Migliorini added that the facility would be totally enclosed, be secured and employ a limited
213 number of individuals.

214

215 Councilor Engle asked the rationale of limiting the process to just cultivation centers to which Law
216 Director Guidetti explained this process is easier to control, it is more secure, requiring less oversight
217 compared to a processing center where there is double transportation traffic. Explaining further, Mr.
218 Guidetti stated cultivation centers send the marijuana out. Processing centers receive it then ship out it,
219 twice the transport thus more security required under this scenario. Mr. Guidetti added that the state is
220 finalizing guidelines and regulations for cultivation centers within the next several weeks which may
221 result is additional changes to Macedonia's proposed ordinance.

222

223 After additional discussion Councilor Tulley likened the three steps in processing marijuana to the wine
224 industry. The grape grower may not perform all the steps from vine to vintner. By comparison the grape
225 grower is the marijuana cultivator, the wine bottler the processing center and the vintner the dispenser.

226

227 **ORD. NO. 37 -2017**

228 DECLARING IMPROVEMENTS TO A CERTAIN PARCEL OF REAL PROPERTY TO BE A
229 PUBLIC PURPOSE, DESCRIBING THE PUBLIC IMPROVEMENTS TO BE MADE TO DIRECTLY
230 BENEFIT SUCH PARCEL, REQUIRING THE OWNER OF THE IMPROVEMENTS ON SUCH
231 PARCEL TO MAKE SERVICE PAYMENTS IN LIEU OF TAXES, ESTABLISHING A MUNICIPAL
232 PUBLIC IMPROVEMENT TAX INCREMENT EQUIVALENT FUND FOR THE DEPOSIT OF SUCH
233 SERVICE PAYMENTS, AND RELATED AUTHORIZATIONS PURSUANT TO OHIO REVISED

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234 CODE SECTIONS 5709.40, 5709.42 AND 5709.43 was **offered** by Ms. Hanneken **for its first reading**
235 **by title only**. Second not required.

236
237 Relative to ORD. NO. 37-2017, Mayor Migliorini explained that TIF means Tax Increment Financing and
238 is an economic development mechanism that is available to local governments to help finance public
239 infrastructure improvements. Payments derived from the increased assessed value of any improvement to
240 real property are directed towards a separate fund to finance the construction of public infrastructure
241 defined within the TIF legislation. The positive of this type of economic development Mayor Migliorini
242 stated is the Nordonia school system does not lose any of its property tax dollars. The tax revenue
243 Macedonia will receive is redirected to the City from the County. The area of this TIF is The Avenue of
244 Macedonia on Valley View Road which is yet to be occupied the Mayor stated. The roads to and from
245 The Avenue; Route 82, Valley View and Park Ave are captured within this TIF. Many communities have
246 been using this form of economic development as a unique and useful tool to generate additional
247 property tax revenue without hurting the local school district.

248
249 Councilor Hanneken asked Mayor Migliorini if he owns any part of The Avenue to which he answered
250 that he does not. Mayor Migliorini stated he did however sell the property where The Avenue is located
251 to the developer. The Mayor added he has no future interests. Ms. Hanneken asked how the additional
252 taxes the City will be receiving are derived to which Mayor Migliorini explained Macedonia will receive
253 those real estate taxes that would have been allocated to Summit County which means for Macedonia that
254 instead of receiving just 9.7% of every real estate tax dollar the City will receive about 30% of each dollar
255 for over a 30-year period. Ms. Hanneken asked for a work session relative to both ORD. NOS. 36 & 37-
256 2017.

257
258 Councilor Engle questioned the notification process and if a public hearing is required to which Mr.
259 Guidetti explained notification to the school district is the only requirement. However since the school
260 district is reimbursed 100% of what it would have normally received than the district's approval is no
261 required Mr. Guidetti added.

262
263 Mayor Migliorini added since this TIF is not for a private individual the statute does not require a public
264 hearing.

265
266 **ORD. NO. 38 -2017**
267 AN ORDINANCE APPROVING THE EDITING AND INCLUSION OF CERTAIN ORDINANCES AS
268 PARTS OF THE VARIOUS COMPONENT CODES OF THE CODIFIED ORDINANCES OF
269 MACEODNIA was **offered** by Mr. Molnar and moved Council waive the requirement that it be read by
270 title on three different days, instructing the Clerk to read it by **title only for all three readings**. Second
271 by Ms. Tulley carried unanimously on a voice vote.

273 Mr. Molnar moved, Ms. Tulley seconded, **adopt ORD. NO. 38-2017** and post according to law.

292 **MAYOR'S REPORT:** None.

293 **COMMITTEE REPORTS:**

294 **Finance Committee** Ms. Tulley mentioned that during the budgeting process finance meetings were
295 scheduled through to May 4th. The May 4 meeting was set in anticipation of the income tax increase on
296 the May 2 ballot, regardless of outcome. Ms. Tulley asked fellow council members if they were inclined
297 to hold the meeting but all agreed it should be held at a later time.

298 **DEPARTMENT REPORTS**

299 **Service Department** Director Hnottavange was not present.

300 **Building Commissioner**

301

302 **Engineer** Mr. Gigliotti reported that the ODOT Route 8 resurfacing project is to start mid May and
303 should last about six weeks. The paving project extends from Rout 82 to Ledge Road with intersection
304 work at Routes 8 & 82 being performed during night hours. Mr. Gigliotti also reported that the Aspen
305 Dental/Starbucks building at the corners of Waters Drive and SR-82 has begun. Completion is expected
306 late 2017. And that the construction of proposed Veteran's Memorial Park at South Bedford and SR-82 is
307 to begin May 9th weather permitting. Construction/renovation of the park is primarily being funded by
308 the Veteran's Committee Mr. Gigliotti added.

309

310 **Recreation Department** Ms. Manley reported that the steam generator ordered to replace the
311 generator that was original to the building was finally delivered but could not be installed
312 because it was not built to specs so another is under construction. This process will take another
313 three weeks before the vendor can install the correct unit Ms. Manley added. Ms. Manley
314 announced that the Recreation Center is hosting a different sort of city-wide garage sale the
315 week-end of June 24 -24, 2017. There will be no booths at Longwood Park for this event.
316 Instead she explained residents wishing to be part to the week-end event need only register their
317 home addresses with Rec Center and shoppers using the list of addresses can plan their routes off
318 the list. Participation is free. However there is a \$5 fee if residents want their respective sale
319 items listed. Rec Center is advertizing the event.

320

321 **Finance Department** Director Hall reported income tax revenue for April was
322 \$611,884.73 compared to last year at this time of 549,330.99. While revenue is up \$62,583.74
323 from 2016 it is down accumulatively \$26,590.44 for the year. Ms. Hall announced WM&E

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324 invoices were mailed yesterday. Since coding was a problem Ms. Hall urged residents call if
325 they have questions regarding their bills. Ms. Hall mentioned that going forward residents can
326 receive their invoices via email in instead of regular mail if they would like. Residents need
327 only follow instructions on the invoices.

328

329 **Fire Department** Chief Black thanked Mayor Migliorini for the proclamation/recognition of Ms.
330 Burch and excellent response of the fire and police departments. The Chief also thanked the Mayor and
331 Council for the appointment of Firefighter Mario Fioritto who replaces a recent hire who left for a higher
332 paying position.

333

334 **Police Department** Chief Golden had no report.

335

336 **Law Department** Law Director Guidetti, addressing the statement Ms. Cathy Loya made during the
337 public comments portion of this evening's meeting explained that pursuant to settlement agreement
338 relative to the NEORSD storm water fee litigation, the City negotiated "outs" for Macedonia. One of the
339 "outs" is that if a comparable district were developed Macedonia would have the opportunity to opt-out
340 of the NEORSD storm water fee program and join that district and in this case it would be Summit
341 County's.

342

343 Mayor Migliorini interjected that at this point Summit County storm water district is only being offered to
344 townships.

345

346 Regarding another matter, Councilor Bilkie asked Mr. Guidetti to clarify misnomer relative to tax refund
347 defined in Ordinance No. 11-2017, relative to income tax rate increase to which Mr. Guidetti explained
348 that residents working in a municipality other than Macedonia are eligible to apply for a refund of paid
349 taxes paid on the rate between the difference of 2% and 2.25%.

350

351 **Longwood Manor Historical Society** John Cassmer, president of LMHS reported the Manor House is
352 finally coming alive, electricity is now working through most of the house and hot water is running in the
353 bathrooms and kitchen. Two large display cases were donated and installed on first floor for items of
354 historical interest.. Mr. Cassmer reported that Macedonia resident John Leben is the second vice-
355 president of operations, that members of the LMHS will be marching in the Memorial Day Parade and
356 that the LMHS paid its liability insurance because Finance Director Hall informed the LMHS that its
357 members are not covered under the City's insurance policy. Mr. Cassmer mentioned a photo of the
358 Mayor Migliorini and current members of Council will be installed in the Manor House.

359

360 **Unfinished business** Councilor Tulley thanked Macedonia service department electrician Brian
361 Schulman for performing the electrical work at the Manor House. Regarding another matter, Ms. Tulley
362 asked Chief Golden when the signal light at the Longwood Park entrance will re-timed to which the Chief
363 responded that the trip that activate the light will not be reprogrammed until the construction work around
364 the new entrance monument sign is completed. Chief Golden explained that it is too costly to fix the trip
365 before the asphalt apron at the entrance is replaced.

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370 **New business** Councilor Tulley thanked Berkshire Road residents who at Longbrook and at Smokerise
371 during the April 19, 2017 “hurricane level rain” took it upon themselves to clean the debris away from the
372 storm water catch basins near their homes.

375 performed by the Western Reserve Community Band, a group of northeast Ohio musicians’ who include

378 said by the level of musicianship of this community band.
